A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO...

At the SPCA Albrecht Center we are dedicated to making life better for pets and the people who love them. We are dedicated to improving the human-animal bond. We are constantly challenging ourselves to answer the question...How can we better communicate that our world would be a better place if we all took the time to listen and learn from the unconditional love offered by pets?

One of the answers was to broaden the scope of our award-winning Phideaux University Enrichment and Training program to include more opportunities for the general public to learn about reward-based training techniques and especially to learn how to understand the behavior of a dog. So often we see owners who misjudge the actions and intent of their dog, which results in frustration and ultimately in surrender or euthanasia for behavioral reasons that could be solved. Happily we are now on our way to reversing that trend.

An even greater challenge found us in early Fall when we responded to requests from our local community to address the need for affordable veterinary care. Like human medicine, the costs of health care have out-stripped the ability of people to pay for it, causing an unfortunate chain reaction that results in neglecting preventive care, which then escalates into a critical care situation that is even more financially out of reach. The phenomenon is affecting all income levels and is the foundation of a nationwide discussion and also a nationwide increase in the number of pets surrendered to shelters or euthanized.

Never one to shrink from a challenge, the SPCA Albrecht Center sees part of its job as keeping animals out of shelters and retaining them in the homes they love. Subsequently, we expanded upon our popular spay/neuter and vaccination services to offer a full service Veterinary Care Center. Our new medical team became fully staffed by mid-October and I am happy to report that the change has been very well received by the community.

Our surveys indicate that the vast majority of our clients had no prior regular veterinarian and seldom visited a clinic. Much like the spay/neuter initiative that we began many years ago, this new, lower cost Veterinary Care concept will help reduce shelter admissions and euthanasia by educating owners and providing health care they can afford.

As an added benefit to the Veterinary profession, we continue to house and train senior year vet students from surrounding universities in our Externship Program, where they receive a great deal of surgery experience and are exposed to the challenges of shelter medicine as well as law enforcement abuse and neglect cases.

Our Thrift Shop Department continues to be our single largest source of revenue. We successfully opened a new store to service Aiken's north-side communities and continued to improve the floor space of the shops at Mitchell Center and Richland Avenue. The stores are important for community outreach as well as remote adoption event sites.

Here in the midlands of South Carolina we live in a relatively small community, but the need to shelter, protect, and care for our animal friends is large. Through good stewardship of your gifts, the wealth of experience gleaned from our Board of Directors, and from the advice of our greatest supporters, our small, but mighty SPCA accomplishes BIG Things!

We are grateful to YOU for helping us do that!!







Going Viral!

Our social media presence is growing every day and plays a very important role in our marketing and outreach efforts. In 2015, two stories in particular resonated with the public and helped us gain attention far outside of our

typical supporter base.

Blinkin, a blind kitten, and Hefty, his "seeing eye" best-friend, gained huge attention in August after we shared their story and photos on Facebook. Their posts and photos were seen by over 6,000 people, and gained over 300 "likes", 100 comments and 50 shares.

The Aiken Standard ran a story and popular online news outlets, blogs and photo-sharing sites such as The Huffington Post, The Dodo, Imgur, ModernCat, and Lovemeow also published stories. As of today, Blinkin' and Hefty's YouTube video has reached 132,255 views! Both kittens were adopted together into a local home.

In July, The Humane Society of the U.S. of SC contacted us about emergency placement for three dogs in McCormick County who were found with their muzzles duct taped shut. Thankfully, the dogs suffered no major or permanent injury. McCormick County Humane Society transferred the dogs to us where they were treated, vetted and placed for adoption. All three dogs were soon adopted, including the beautiful German Shepherd who was adopted by an Aiken County Sheriff's Deputy.





The Aiken Standard ran a story about the dogs' ordeal, and we posted photos on our Facebook page resulting in an overwhelming amount of calls seeking adoption, and a total Facebook reach of over 54,000 people!


LEGACY SOCIETY





LOOKING AHEAD...

Growth & Expansion

Our Spay/Neuter Clinic, now full-service Veterinary Care Center, will undergo an expansion in 2016 into what is now the garage. Three separate exam rooms will be added to provide our clients with more privacy and to allow for better communication with the pet owner, and to add needed space for thorough exams and procedures. The garage, which now serves as storage space and City of Aiken Animal Control intake, will be relocated just outside of the current space.



Phideaux University

Our very successful and popular Phideaux University Training and Enrichment program continues to grow and evolve with every passing year. Although we are keeping up with, and often surpassing the Association of Shelter Veterinarians minimum humane requirements for shelter dogs, there is always room for improvement. Here are a few of the things to come:





New Agility Field

Thanks to a generous donation by Legacy Society member Bob Johnson,

we now have a play area complete with agility equipment for our resident dogs. Although dog agility is not a goal for our shelter dogs, the use of each piece of equipment helps increase confidence and gives our dogs another way to find people rewarding, fun and trustworthy. We are also considering opening the field for public use at some point as an added source of revenue.

Public Training Classes

Trish Wamsat (pictured above, right), a highly regarded trainer from the San Francisco Bay Area, has joined our team, bringing her unique and highly practical, yet FUN training expertise to the SPCA. With Trish as Headmaster of our public training program, we now offer a large menu of age-appropriate classes for dogs, puppies and their owners.

TADSAW – Train A Dog, Save A Warrior

As a designated trainer for this Austin, Texas organization, Trish has opened up another avenue by which our dogs can leave the shelter: by becoming a Public Access Service Dog for a veteran in need. TADSAW is different from other groups in that they prefer fully mature mixed-breed dogs for their program instead of terribly expensive (and hard to get) purebred dogs that have been purpose-bred, raised, then trained by professionals. Additionally, the dogs are placed directly with the veteran, allowing them to bond while they work with their assigned trainer three times per week for the six months it usually takes to be certified as a team. We have already placed two dogs and are excited about the prospect 12 of being able to give back to those who have sacrificed so much for our country.
